

Exploring the Parish of Winteringham

Steeped in its historical past Winteringham stands near the northern end of Roman Ermine Street overlooking the River Humber and the Yorkshire Wolds beyond. Exploring in each direction from the Jubilee Gardens

Picturesque Low Burgage leads towards the River Humber standing on the site of an old malt kiln the Methodist Chapel was opened in 1978.

Passenger trains steamed into the station (now Station Farm) between 1907 and 1925.

On to the Haven (background photograph), once the hive of industry where ships were built and repaired and from where the market boat sailed to Hull.

In High Burgage is Mill House where once was a steam mill. On Earlsgate Village Green stands the Village pump.

Wide Silver Street displays houses dating from the 17th and 18th Centuries.

Scarborough House is a particularly fine building.

Along West End look for Earlsgate Farm (1683), the dove cote of 1853 (now part of Winteringham Fields Restaurant accommodation) and the Manor House. The Wesleyan Methodist Chapel was opened in 1891. Village children were educated in the National School.

Nestling at the western end is All Saints Church with its Saxon origins, a visit is a must for any explorer of this North Lincolnshire village.
